How does the voucher program work?

Vouchers are approved for use at any Centre County veterinarian's office and the Allegheny Spay/Neuter Clinic in Woodland. They act as a coupon for an amount off of the cost of surgery. Two veterinarian's offices, All Pets and Allegheny S/N, currently accept vouchers as the full price of surgery for cats. More detailed information, including the specifically approved amount, is provided with the voucher, which will be sent to you in the mail.

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PAWS vouchers are available (for cats) to those who live, work, or attend school full-time in Huntingdon County

Your next steps

- Mail, fax, or email your completed application to PAWS
- Wait for your application to be processed and for the voucher to be mailed back to you.
- Find a Centre County veterinarian, make an appointment, and follow your veterinarian’s instructions. This includes discussing the appropriate age at which to alter the cat.

Restrictions

- Huntingdon County residents are eligible for vouchers for cats (feral or non-feral) only.
- Vouchers may only be used at veterinarians in Centre County or the Allegheny Spay/Neuter Clinic in Clearfield.
- Up to 6 PAWS SNAP vouchers per household, per calendar year, are available for non-feral animals.
- All feral cats must have their ear tipped at the time of surgery.
- Applications must be received in advance of your appointment. Please allow at least 2 weeks for processing of your application. Retroactive vouchers will not be approved.

* Feral cats are “wild” cats who cannot be easily touched, and therefore the sex may not be determined until sedated. They are most often cats who will be released outdoors after being spayed/neutered. These cats must have their ear tipped while sedated to easily identify them as altered.
